This year (2022) we have already collected about 150 coats, some of which have already be delivered to the jails, but we still have about 150 to go, since demand is high this year. Christmas Cards-Many volunteers have written a total of about 355 Christmas Cards to be offered to inmates at local jails. We are thankful for all that have shown the love of Christ to those inmates who were going through an otherwise very lonely Christmas.

Volunteers- We are so thankful for all of our volunteers. The last years was a difficult one for all of us due to Covid and all the mandates, restrictions and rules it brought. The volunteers took so much on their shoulders (submitting paperwork, background checks, orientations, vaccinations, mask mandates, quarantines, doing lessons via zoom) just to be able to go back in to the jails to preach the Word. They really love God!
